

 The International Baccalaureate (IB) approach applies ten characteristics to describe an IB learner. As an IB World School, at Jurupa Hills all students, staff and teachers strive to demonstrate the attributes of Inquirer, Thinker, Caring, Balanced, Knowledgeable, Open Minded, Risk taker, Communicator, Reflective and Principled.

This "IB Learner Profile" also demonstrates how the IB approach is about much more than academic success. Each month at Jurupa Hills one characteristic is highlighted. For the month of August, we are focusing on

- IB learners show empathy, compassion and respect towards the needs and feelings of others. They have a personal commitment to service, and act to make a positive difference to the lives of others and to the environment. Students who are want people around them to be happy and are sensitive to their needs. They think about the world and work to take care of their community and the environment. They remember to treat others how they themselves would like to be treated.

-Role model the caring behavior you would like to see.

-Use kind words; help people without being asked. Being an active listener shows you care about people.

- -Even a simple thing like holding a door for someone shows you are aware of others around you and want to help them.
- -Get involved with community organizations.
- -Care about the environment--you are helping the future of the globe.
- -After reading a book or article, spend some time considering how the people in the book acted. Was someone in the book caring? All of the time or just some of the time?

Were all of the characters in the book caring or just some of them?

- -Write an encouraging note to someone. Show them you are thankful for them.
- -Take action for positive changes (for example, to promote intercultural understanding, foster caring relationships, care for self and others)
